


My last board report. How time flies...

Student Engagement News

Rick Cantrell, Joshua Anderson and I have constantly been in touch about student engagement and the changing face of forestry in our region. Several events have happened over the past few months. One critical and the well-represented event was the SAF National Conference. We (APSAF) had over 50 students (graduate and undergraduate) attend the national conference in Lousiville, KY. At least 7 of them participated in the poster contest event and one or two presented their research.

Duke University Nicholas School of Environment's Society of American Foresters is hosting the NC State

University College of Natural Resources SAF and Duke University's SAF student-professional annual dinner and networking event in April 2020. NCSU College of Natural Resources Dean, FER Dept. The Appalachian Society of American Foresters is inviting abstracts for student presentations at the 2020 APSAF Winter Meeting in Norfolk, VA, January 29-31. The theme is Gaining a Competitive Edge: "Join foresters from across the three state division as we explore how to gain a competitive edge for ourselves our businesses and out states." While all abstracts focused on forestry are welcome, we also encourage abstracts that are focused on forest wildlife management and forest management practices that impact Fisheries.

Presentations should focus on current research that is either completed or ongoing and has reportable results. Planned research projects will not be considered for oral presentation at the meeting but are encouraged as poster submissions. The first author must be a current or recent graduate (within the past year) and be from a school within the ApSAF region (VA, NC, SC). Any abstracts that are submitted for an oral presentation and not selected will be invited to give a poster presentation.

Oral presentations will be "Lightning talk" style with 5-10 minutes for a single presentation. The goal of this format is to allow for more student presentations in a format that concisely and efficiently gets to the primary point(s) of the topic.

Abstracts had to be submitted by 11:59 pm on Friday, September 30, 2019. The authors were notified via email in early November 2019. Abstracts invited for oral or poster presentation will be published in the conference program.

There's a \$250 prize for Best Student presentation and a \$125 prize for Best Student poster awarded at the end of the meeting.Questions? Call Adam Downing, adowning@vt.edu

APSAF Historical Records Archive

In 1978, APSAF entered into a formal arrangement with the Perkins Library system on the campus of Duke University to permanently retain and archive printed records and documents for our Society. These items are housed at their David M. Rubenstein Rare Book & Manuscript site on campus.

To ensure long term availability of our historic and relevant records, articles, minutes, activities, etc., it is important that all such items be submitted periodically for inclusion in this collection. Leadership and members are encouraged to ensure this is done. All items being submitted should be sent

to the APSAF Historian for transfer to the archive site. Contact information is on the APSAF website.

SAF at the World Scout Jamboree

Over 45,000 international scouts and leaders from 168 nations descended on southern West Virginia for the 19th World Scout Jamboree (WSJ19)and SAF was there! For twelve days, coed young people aged 14 to 17 years old, came together at BSA's Summit Bechtel Reserve (SBR) for this event hosted by the national scout organizations from Canada, Mexico, and the United States.

The theme for WSJ19 was "Unlock a New World" with sub-themes that included Service, Sustainability, Friendship, Leadership, and adventure. The Summit Bechtel Reserve was selected in part since it is the "first" purpose built jamboree site in the world that includes a larger outdoor stadium with a capacity for 80,000 (AT & T Summit Stadium.)

Once again SAF teamed up with staff of the West Virginia Division of Forestry (WVDOF) for an exhibit. Both organizations are no stranger to SBR having volunteered to staff an exhibit and teach Forestry merit badge at the 2013 and 2017 National Scout Jamborees.

For the World Scout Jamboree, SAF and WVDOF were located in the Knowledgeable Work Force area in the western end of the summit center. This area was designed for scouts to explore the technologies of the future including the opportunity to fly drones, use 3-D printers, travel the world through virtual reality and in the case of the SAF/WVDOF see and learn about engineered wood products and other innovations of wood.

The exhibit also included an exercise in map orienteering, leaf and seed samples of local hardwoods, and an opportunity to test your knowledge about

conditions that effect tree growth using varying sized tree cookies from a common area.

SAF and the West Virginia Division of Forestry were ably assisted at our exhibit by Balázs Pálinkás, a teen age scout from Hungary. The West Virginia Division-Allegheny Society took the lead for SAF



providing many volunteers including Rudy Williams, Melissa Nicely, Linda Carnell, Barb Breshock, Kimberly Bohn, Mike Reese, Chris Evans, Mary Beth Adams Continued, page 14


